# LEADERSHIP LETTER

### Dear Friends,

This year, more than 3,000 students came to our bases in California to get outside. They climbed granite, hiked along cholla cactus lined trails, licked their bowls clean, and leapt off logs at our Ropes Challenge Course. Their end-of-course reflection letters tell the stories of how their uncertainty at their beginning turned into confidence as they started—and completed—new things.

In post-course surveys, students shared that they felt more prepared to face their worlds: 77% said they gained confidence to try new things, and 86% said they gained the courage to take on new challenges.

gained the courage to take on new challenges I'm newly returning to Outward Bound, so I can't take credit. But I'm just as inspired to be part of this journey—where students discover courage, confidence, and connection. Outward Bound was a pivotal experience for me too—where I honed leadership skills and built lasting relationships on the rocks, rivers and trails of the Appalachians.

Stepping into the unknown, as those 3,000 students did in 2024, brought them together. They made deep connections forged by shared adventure and reflection. I'm told we say this every year—and I believe we always will—but the spark of connection ignited on an Outward Bound course has never been more vital than it is today. # **ALUMNI STORY**

### Paul & Levi Ruddick: A Father-Son Outward Bound Legacy

In July, Levi joined a crew of seven to hike through Sequoia Kings Canyon, a place John Muir called Yosemite's rival for its spectacular beauty.

It was Levi's third Outward Bound expedition. He had seen pictures of the Sierra and wanted to experience the "absolutely gorgeous California mountains" for himself.

As he got older, his first Outward Bound experience stuck with him. He wanted a bigger challenge, and the beauty of the Sierra made OBCA his next step. The course was much harder, he said, but it was the kind of hard that's doable and finite—totally different from school, where the deadlines keep coming and the pressure never lets up.

Levi loved not having his phone. When it's always within reach, it's hard to step away. He said he doesn't want to scroll endlessly, but it's easy to get pulled in. The expedition gave him the space to fully unplug, be away from that option, and then not miss the screen at all. His dad, Paul, also an Outward Bound alum, said it was detoxing for Levi. And even if it doesn't end all the mindless scrolling forever, "It's a reference point an experience of a totally different way of living where you don't need any of it. Now he knows that it's possible to reset, and that will last his whole lifetime."

This most recent expedition was exactly that—a reset before college. Levi felt like it was a microcosm of what was coming: a new place, new sleeping arrangements, meeting new people.

Now, as Levi takes steps toward becoming an emergency room doctor, Paul sees the connection. These experiences gave him the confidence to know he's capable of doing really difficult things.

## FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

In 2024, OBCA ended the year with a \$248K deficit. While expenses remained aligned with our budget, revenue came in below projections. This was largely due to staffing transitions in the Development team and challenges in filling both Open Enrollment and Group courses. Despite these hurdles, OBCA continued to deliver high-quality programming and invest in our long-term goals. We are actively addressing these challenges and are optimistic about the year ahead, with new strategies in place to strengthen both contributed and earned income.

### Community Days at the Ropes Challenge Course

Most programs at the Ropes Challenge Course are booked by intact professional and community groups, but one Saturday a month, February through October, we open up the course to the community for free! In 2024, we had 10 community days, and 236 participants showed up!

# JOSHUA TREE

### Rooted in the Desert: A New Chapter in Joshua Tree

We officially purchased a basecamp in Joshua Tree at the end of 2024! Just a five-minute walk from the northern boundary of Joshua Tree National Park, the site is a multi-function property with three buildings and nearly five acres of land.

The investment in a permanent Outward Bound home provides immediate savings in temporary rental accommodations for our staff, and seasonal transportation and storage of our expedition gear. Having climate-controlled accommodations, ample storage and close proximity to the park tremendously improves our staff recruitment and retention capabilities.

This new space is already serving as a home base for staff and programming—and its potential is just beginning to unfold. With this permanent basecamp, we're poised to:

- Expand our program offerings to students with limited access to outdoor education
- Provide a safe and welcoming environment for outdoor education for more young people
- Ensure the best staff to lead our programs with permanent and secure housing
- Protect the natural beauty of Joshua Tree through sustainable practices
- Join the Mojave Desert community to bring enrichment and team building opportunities to participants of all ages

### From Point Reyes to Joshua Tree: A **Decade of Discovery with Mission High**

In 2011, we began our partnership with San Francisco's Mission High School, bringing nine students on a threeday backpacking trip in Point Reyes. Over the years, our collaboration has expanded to include one-day urban programs, backpacking and rock climbing adventures, and ropes course challenges.

In 2024, students from the Fire/Emergency Medical School program participated in Wilderness First Aid (WFA) training in Joshua Tree National Park, marking an exciting new chapter in our work together.

Through this long-standing partnership, we've had the privilege of watching students build confidence, resilience, and gain real-world experience through outdoor challenges.

# MIDPINES

### Minarets Return: High Sierra Course Area Update

We paused using the Minarets for expedition after the 2020 Creek Fire. But this year, students and staff returned to this stunning alpine zone to find granite peaks, clear alpine lakes, and signs of land recovery all around. It's been moving to witness the landscape's return—and to explore it once again.

This course area stretches from Lillian Lake to Fernandez Pass, up to Isberg Lakes and the North Fork of the San Joaquin River. It's full of options for solos, horsepacker resupplies, and backcountry climbing.



Each year, Outward Bound USA selects just four outstanding staff from hundreds for their impact on Outward Bound and the communities we serve. This year, Outward Bound California staff earned two of those top honors!

## SCHOLARSHIPS

We are guided by the belief that every person, regardless of means, should have the opportunity to discover more within themselves through the challenge and adventure of an Outward Bound course.

In 2024, more than half of our students received a scholarship or financial assistance to attend a program. Thanks to the generous support of our donors, we were able to provide full tuition, gear, and travel for participants in programs like the Youth Leadership Corps, the Pinnacle Scholarship Program, and Outward Bound for Veterans.

We also offered scholarships to youth-serving organizations on our Ropes Challenge Course, expanding access to day-long experiences that build confidence and connection. For our open enrollment expeditions, we worked with individuals through case-by-case tuition reductions and offered sliding scale options to make our courses more accessible.

While financial barriers still exist, we are continually working to reduce them—because we believe the outdoors should be a place where everyone belongs.
